The second part concentrates on the identification of functional groups of organic compounds of pharmaceutical interest, giving more attention to chemical identification.</p>

## COURSE REGULATIONS

### ***Participation***

**Description of Exams**

Test questions will predominately come from material presented in the Laboratory lectures. Practical exam will be conducted during the regularly scheduled lecture period. Final Exam will consist of a combination of multiple choice, short answer, match, true and false and/or descriptive questions.

**Homework:** Will be given for each experiment, while the experiment in progress you are supposed to work on them continuously and submit in next laboratory when finished the experiment. You are also expected to work on in-experiment examples, self-tests and representative number of end of experiment problems. The answers of self-tests and end of experiment exercises are given at the end of the laboratory manual.

**Quizzes:** Unannounced quizzes will be given during or/and at the end of each experiment based upon the previous experiment. It will enforce that you come prepared to the laboratory.

No make-up exams, homework or quizzes will be given. Only documented absences will be considered as per HU guidelines.
