COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course aims to introduce the student to the phytochemical and natural drugs that has been registered internationally and nationally, in addition, the student will be introduced to the medicinal plants used to treat various disorders such as the disorders related to the GI tract, the nervous system, the cardiovascular system the autonomic system, the skin and the endocrine system. This course will emphasize on the duration of drug use, drug-drug interactions and side effects related to the use of the medicinal plants. In addition to that the student will learn more about the use of hallucinogenic plants, their toxicity and side effects related to these plants with emphasis on the plants that habitat in the Jordanian environment.

Course Objectives

1. To provide the student with the required information about the role of pharmacists in Complementary Alternative Medicine (CAM).

- 2. To introduce the student to the phytochemical and natural drugs that has been registered internationally and nationally to treat specific diseases.

COURSE REGULATIONS

Participation

Class participation and attendance are important elements of every student's learning experience at The Hashemite University, and the student is expected to attend all classes. A student should not miss more than 15% of the classes during a semester. Those exceeding this limit of 15% will receive a failing grade regardless of their performance. It is a student's responsibility to monitor the frequency of their own absences. Attendance record begins on the first day of class irrespective of the period allotted to drop/add and late registration. It is a student's responsibility to sign-in; failure to do so will result in non-attendance being recorded.

In exceptional cases, the student, with the instructor's prior permission, could be exempted from attending a class provided that the number of such occasions does not exceed the limit allowed by the University. The instructor will determine the acceptability of an absence for being absent. A

student who misses more than 25% of classes and has a valid excuse for being absent will be allowed to withdraw from the course.

On average, students must spend 10 hrs of study and preparation weekly. At the beginning of the lectures, be on time and don't leave before the end of the lecture without an accepted excuse. If you missed a class, you must find out about any announcements or assignments you missed. For any clarification, please communicate with your instructor at her posted office hour by appointment. Listen well to the lecture, if you have a question, ask your instructor. You will find the course material at the course team after the lecture.
